This term we saw the year 5 classes return to Mr. Tom's Forest School.


The children's Discovery Topic this term was 'Ancient Greece'.

It was an absolute pleasure to welcome all the children back to Forest School; it was like the children had never left...












How did we link our Forest School Experience this term to our Discovery Topic of Ancient Greece?














We enjoyed making our own Greek temples using mud and sticks.

see.




Learning respect and raising awareness.

Den building and imaginative play.












The children were introduced to our emergency survival shelter. They were all very interested and keen to practise the technique!

The children were very excited to visit Forest School when the temperature dropped enough for us this term to wake up to some ice! Some of the children then enjoyed making their own hanging ice decorations.












enjoyed practising their DT skills, they made reindeers, Christmas trees and gnomes.

We used Elder to make our own Necklaces and bracelets. Great for our fine motor skills!










"We got to just 'play' and enjoyed the mud!"

They did make me chuckle; some of the children decided that they liked their design so much that they decided not to gift it and keep it for themselves!






